Two days after giving birth to her third son, Renee arrived at the Stevenson Memorial Hospital (SMH) Emergency Department on New Year's Eve 2018, fighting a high fever.

Suspecting an infection, Dr. Iraji ordered blood work and administered intravenous antibiotics. Renee was about to be discharged, when her fever mysteriously spiked again.

"Dr. Iraji made the decision to keep me and I am so grateful. If she had not done this, my story could have been very different. Knowing I had a newborn, we were moved to the OB Department so my husband and I could be together with our baby. Dr. Scheeres immediately started me on several antibiotics, proactively treating me, without even knowing what I had."

As the New Year began, the results came in. **Renee had invasive Group A strep.** An extremely serious, potentially life-threatening infection.

"By the time I found out what I had, I had started to feel better. Still the anxiety and 'what ifs' played in my head. This is where all the nurses in the unit truly helped to make me feel better. They took such great care of me," recalls Renee. "And there aren't even words to express my gratitude towards Dr. Scheeres. He took the time to consult with experts and he called to check in on me, even on his time off. He is the reason why I came out of this so well. He treated me for the worst, without knowing I had the worst."
